# Sample Interview Questions for Ally Henny I Won't Shut Up: Finding Your Voice When the World Tries to Silence You

- Thanks for joining us! Will you tell us a little bit about your story and why you decided to write I
  Won't Shut Up?
- You know what it's like to navigate racism and racialized sexism, having spent most of your life in predominantly white spaces. Tell us about that. What encouragement do you have for those of us who are in the same situation?
- In your book, you talk about managing the losses that come with finding and using your voice. Can
  you say more about that?
- You talk about several experiences that you've had with racism that are quite intense, but the way you recount them almost seems comedic. Why did you choose to tell your story in this way?
- Your book is divided into acts, and has an overture, two intermissions, and a curtain call. What's behind this theme?
- As a Black woman who is talkative in some situations and more reserved in others, you're often the subject of white suspicion and insecurity. How has this shaped your identity?
- What is one way Black women can reclaim their loud, powerful voice?
- You say that Black women always have to be "on" and don't get no rest. What does that feel like?
- It may surprise many of us that you struggle with self-consciousness, embarrassment, and even shame around using your voice. How do you stay true to your voice despite these feelings?
- Your grandma's cancer diagnosis brought you face-to-face with Injustice. What was this like? How
  did it make your voice stronger?
- What is injustice as the "constellation of harms"? How does it help us fight against individualism and toxic positivity?
- The world places heavy burdens of white supremacy on Black people. What are some examples of these burdens? How can we move forward and find freedom by laying our burdens down?
- How has your faith played a role in your life? What message do you have to fellow Christians seeking to stand for racial equality and support Black voices in the church today?
- Thank you for such an encouraging conversation. We've talked about a lot of great things today. If our audience could take away one thing from this interview, what would it be?
